It's been quite a busy year for us this year. As planned, last September, we held our away day at Alresford Methodist Church. It is already planned to hold another community Advent event this year which we hope and pray will attract even more local people to come and see who we are and what we do. My thanks go to all those who make such things possible; those who volunteer to run such events but also those volunteers behind the scenes, who help to maintain our church and its facilities so that such events are possible.

#### WORSHIP

Our regular patterns of worship have continued over the past year and our congregation numbers have been maintained. A worship consultation meeting was held earlier this year and produced a detailed report to the Church Council. It was felt that our current pattern of worship suits our congregations although it was suggested that preachers should be encouraged to try different styles on occasion. Messy Church and Lego Church continue to be popular and it was agreed that streaming of Weeke's Sunday worship continues to serve a useful propose and should be continued. A particular point of note was the success of a well-advertised "special" service which attracted significant numbers of our local community beyond our usual congregations in both Weeke and King's Somborne. It is hoped that we can continue to build on this, perhaps by introducing some additional special services throughout the year.

King's Somborne continues to have an active plan of ecumenical worship, including Messy Church, and it is hoped that this can be developed further. In Weeke, it was felt that it might be more successful if ecumenical work could be more mission rather than worship focussed but this needs to be investigated further.

#### SMALL GROUPS

In early Autumn 2023 the small groups at Wesley embarked on the challenge of studying the Epistle to the Romans using a new Bible Society resource over ten studies with teaching videos, session notes, and exposition. The conduct of each study varied according to the set theme. The series was studied in two phases: five units up to Christmas and five from then till Easter. At the end of each phase a more informal time of sharing and hospitality was held. The groups contributed a commentary to WSLink on what they had found especially inspiring from the course.

Given the benefits experienced by both groups studying the same material, and following conversation within them, they have now started a new Bible study series on the theme "Names of God". A small group has met at King's Somborne and has included an ecumenical mix of attendees. Before Christmas the group focused on the prequel to the Nativity Story, exploring Mary's visit to Elizabeth, through Mary's Song and then looking at Joseph and his journey.

The groups continue to offer valued and vital places for prayer, reflection and fellowship. Thanks are due to all those who have contributed to sustaining and nurturing the life of these groups: in practical ways, in leading, and in being prepared to share together the quest for deeper understanding of faith and the realities of faith-in-action.

We feel it is time now for a broadened group of people to enable the Outreach/Community activities to be the main focus for the churches' missional aspirations.

### MISSION GROUP

The small Group of people who comprise the Mission Group have followed the vision for the church:-

- raising awareness of the way we can serve a wider community here in the UK and the world,
- involving the whole church in a series of locally arranged morning services to join in worship with our main charities as a theme, raising money to support the three main charities: Water Harvest, Brickworks and Basics Bank,

# KING'S SOMBORNE CHAPEL

We have had another encouraging year here at King's Somborne. Although attendance to Sunday services is still down, numbers have increased in our outreach activities.

### ATTENDANCE AT SUNDAY SERVICES

Numbers in the congregation can vary, anything from 2 to 10 people. Special occasions have been well attended such as the Advent Carol Service with a congregation of 36 and The World Day of Prayer which, this year was hosted by the Parish Church, and attended by 28 people. Our Good Friday service, followed by tea, had a congregation of 22. Once again, this was a very special time for us to gather together and remember Jesus' death on the cross.

### **DROP-IN COFFEE MORNINGS**

These are becoming increasingly popular and have grown in attendance over the year. We can have any number up to 24. There's always lots of chat and people enjoy coming for the company and the happy atmosphere. It has been good to welcome people new to the village as well.

## **EPWORTH LUNCHES**

These continue to be popular. We cater for 24 diners and have an excellent team of helpers who enable the occasion to run smoothly. We continue to be very grateful to a team of very good cooks who kindly take turns to provide the meals. The quizzes at the end of the meal are enjoyed and can be quite competitive! The charities we have supported over the year have been Andover Young Carers, Jane Scarth, Butterflies Bereavement, Romsey Food Bank and Naomi House, raising a total of £535 for them from our charity tin. All these charities are local to us. Once again, for our annual inspection, we received a 5 star award for hygiene.

### WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

We have a possible 16 ladies attend our Women's Fellowship, depending on their availability and the subject matter! Once again we have had a varied programme and have had some open meetings where we invited anyone to join us. One such meeting was a talk given by a representative from Andover Young Carers. This proved to be a very interesting and moving talk and it was quite humbling to learn how young carers were involved in helping an ill parent at home, with the support of the charity. The charity also offers the young carers time out in after school clubs or a holiday to give them a break. The talk was followed by a coffee morning/sale a few weeks later, to raise money for the charity. We raised £540 which was an excellent amount.

#### **MESSY CHURCH**

Messy Church began by being small in numbers but this has altered during the year as new families have joined. We cater for approximately 30 people, including adults and children. The leaders of the activities consist of Anglicans and Methodists and two young people who were members of Messy Church and have now become Junior Leaders. The activities are well prepared and organised and a write up about the afternoon appears in our village Gauntlet magazine.

#### MULTIMEDIA

There has been little change or renewal of equipment or practices for at least the last twelve years, except for replacing the multimedia computer and adding a 'streaming box' to enable services to be available online. As equipment ages, people aspire to do new things and now a regular online community is accessing our services. We need to replace things which are no longer functioning satisfactorily, take advantage of the latest technology and ease the ever more complex task of the operators. The Multimedia Operator's screen is unreliable and also a different shape is needed when working with more complex services. The Live-stream Operator's computer (used for both connection to YouTube and control of the PTZ camera) is 15 years old and unreliable. This old laptop computer is best replaced by a modern mini-computer and small screen, both mounted on the back of the desk.

The continuity of the programme transmitted to YouTube needs to be improved by adding a second, much less expensive, camera to work in conjunction with the PTZ one.

Problems have always arisen from the fact that the walls of the Sanctuary are made of hard concrete blocks, which reflect rather than absorb sound, and the octagonal shape of the building only makes the problem worse. The present analogue audio mixer does not provide adequate tools to resolve these problems and modern digital solutions have become available which could offer a significant improvement in sound quality throughout the Sanctuary. Such equipment is being investigated.

The present seating arrangements for operators are inadequate in terms of visibility and communication (with each other and with musicians, as well as always having a clear view of what is happening at the pulpit area).

A new, larger desk is required and it will also provide more capacity for internal equipment and wiring.

There are other improvements under consideration. The Multimedia and Property teams are now considering the detail.

The Circuit Assessment increased from £37 240 to £39 109 for the year 2023/24. The Circuit has proposed to hold the assessments as they are for the year 2024/25. It may be a relief but the projections of expenditure at the two sites are a concern. 2023/24 has encountered extensive financial expenditure in buildings maintenance and is likely to present at different outlook of accounts by the end of the year. The generous giving that has kept the church afloat is appreciated and a little flexibility will be more appreciated and most welcome.
